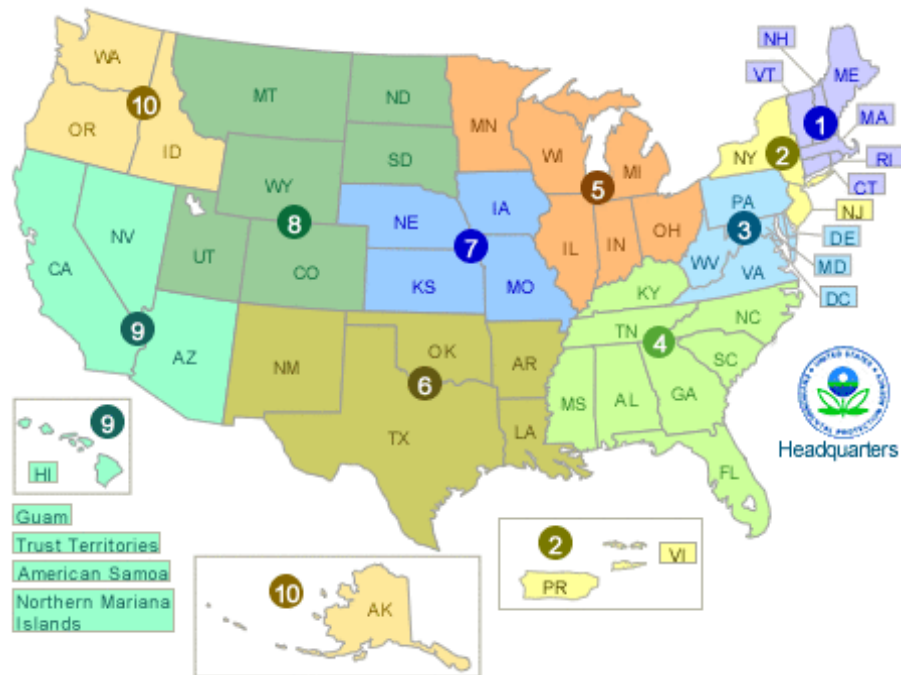

Overview of Environmental Justice for New England (EJforNE)



Background

EPA Environmental Justice (EJ) Thriving Communities Grantmaking (TCGM) Program has selected grantmakers across the U.S, as part of the Justice 40 Initiative, to provide \$48M/each in grants within their respective regions over three years.



Goal of TCGM Program: support community-based organizations, EJ organizations, nonprofit organizations, and other entities representing underserved, urban, rural, Indigenous, remote, and capacity constrained communities in implementing projects to **address local environmental and/or public health challenges**

Region 1 New England includes:

Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont, and 10 Tribal Nations

Shared Values

We aim to counter historical disinvestment in communities on the frontlines of the climate crisis including communities of color, immigrant communities, indigenous communities, and low-income communities. This opportunity seeks to seed and build deeper capacity for a sustainable environmental justice movement to address environmental hazards, climate resiliency, and energy justice, and build livable and healthy communities. This funding, which includes \$40 million in grants over three years, comes as an effort by the Biden-Harris Administration to strip away traditional barriers communities have faced in applying for federal grants.



Anchor Organizations



Anchor Organizations

Provide community context, build deeper capacity, and support outreach within each New England state

Organizations and coalitions with deep connections to or understanding of existing on-the-ground environmental justice organizing, capacity, and needs in the state they work in. Their efforts ensure the grantmaking program remains rooted in equitable engagement that centers the voices of those most impacted by environmental injustices.

- Nonprofit organizations, community-based and grassroots nonprofit organizations
- Tribal governments (both federally recognized and state-recognized) and intertribal consortia
- Native American Organizations

Note: If the proposed project takes place outside of a community identified by the CEJST as disadvantaged, a justification can be submitted for consideration.

Tier 2: Planning Projects	1 - 2 years	Up to \$250,000	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Partnership building• Developing communications plan or curricula• Projects or activities to spur community involvement (e.g., cleanups of vacant lots)
Tier 3: Implementation Projects	Up to 2 years	Up to \$350,000	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Strengthening cumulative impact, public health, or environmental justice protections• Conducting healthy home assessments; increasing energy or water efficiency in homes or buildings• Creating internships or implementing workforce development programs

Note: An organization may apply for two sequenced phases at the same time; however funding will be received for the subsequent phase until the previous one is successfully completed.

 - Tribal governments (both federally recognized and state-recognized) and intertribal consortia
 - Native American Organizations
 - Local governments
 - Institutions of higher education
 - Philanthropic and civic organizations with nonprofit status

Application Review Criteria

The following criteria will be used to determine which applications are recommended for funding:

- **Community need**
- **Impact** of the proposed approach on communities inequitably affected by environmental and climate injustices
- **Feasibility** of approach as supported by organizational and other capacities
- **Engagement** of community directly affected by environmental, climate, and public health issues and inequities, including your leadership
- Opportunity for **sustainability** and impact of your project
- **Involvement** of applicant in environmental and climate justice work and/or other community projects
- **Availability of other resources** to support this work



Application Considerations

- Funded projects for both the Seed Fund and Tiers 1-3 must focus on at least one disadvantaged community in the New England States as indicated on the [*Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool*](#) or make a case for why they propose a project outside this area.
- All applicant entities, including fiscally sponsored organizations/groups, must have a UEI (Unique Entity Identifier). Please visit [SAM.gov](https://sam.gov) to request an UEI.

This process checks to see if you are a licensed entity in your state (it does not require you to be a 501(c)3).

Seed Funds are available for up to \$75,000 for efforts to support community-based organizations with limited capacities, which are defined as those having an equivalent of four or less paid full-time staff members at the time of application, amongst other criteria. A full eligibility definition can be found in the request for proposal (RFP).
